SUBJECT: 2008 GENERAL PLAN ANNUAL REPORT

BACKGROUND

Section 65400(b) of the Government Code requires the City Council to be provided with an Annual Report on the status of the General Plan and progress in its implementation, including progress in meeting its share of regional housing needs. The Annual Report is due on or before July 1 of each year; however, the portion of the report on the Housing Element progress is due in April. The law also requires that a copy of the annual report be submitted to the Office of Planning and Research and Department of Housing and Community Development.

DISCUSSION

Attached is a report on the status of the implementation of the General Plan. It includes summary of General Plan amendments processed and actions or activities relating to each of the City's General Plan Elements during this time period. In some instances, staff has identified actions completed in the last several years for program implementation.

The Housing Element section includes a table that quantifies, where possible, the number of dwelling units constructed, conserved, or rehabilitated during the reporting period.

The report will be submitted to the Office of Planning and Research and Department of Housing and Community Development, following receipt by the City Council.

ALTERNATIVES

The annual report is a statutory requirement and the Council could receive and file the report or the Council could direct staff to revise the report as directed.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends the City Council receive and file the report. Provide any comments on the annual report and direct staff to submit the report to the appropriate state agencies.

In compliance with Section 69400 of the California Government Code, this report has been prepared to summarize the status of the City of Grover Beach General Plan and the steps taken during this period to implement general plan goals and policies.

The following table lists the element of the City of Grover Beach General Plan and the date the element was last updated.

AMENDMENTS

The certification of the 2008 Housing Element was completed in November, 2008. During 2008, the City did not process any other amendments to the general plan.

AMENDMENTS TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE

During 2008, the City completed processing the Live-Work amendment to allow for live-work units in the C-I-C zone located north of Grand Avenue. This was accepted by the California Coastal Commission in December, 2008.

In May, 2008, the City also completed the adoption of the Planned Development Overlay for the Grand Avenue Commercial corridor.

In March 2008, the City adopted updated development R-1, R-2, and R-3 districts to increase lot coverage and modified allowable heights (R-2, R-3)

STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION

Land Use Element:

The existing Land Use Element was adopted in 1992 and contains over 130 programs intended to implement goals and policies relative to growth management, housing conservation and development, commercial conservation and development, industrial conservation and development, resource conservation and development, public services and facilities, and neighborhood conservation and development plans. During 2008, the City initiated an update of the Land Use Element to incorporate the community's

consensus vision that resulted from the City's visioning process in 2004. While this effort was temporarily suspended, this project has recently been reinitiated and we anticipate adoption of an updated Land Use Element in fall 2009.

Specific programs identified in the Land Use Element that were addressed in this past year include:

- Monitoring of housing development to ensure that the growth management capacity is not exceeded. The program identifies no more than 123 dwelling units are allowed annually or at a rate of two and one-half percent. During 2008, a total of 16 units were constructed. (Program 4.1.1)
- The City maintains a Capital Improvement Program to identify the community's needs based upon project population and other pertinent factors. (Programs 4.4.1, 9.1.2, 9.1.3, 9.1.4, 9.1.5, 9.2.1)
- The City continues to manage the development impact fee program that requires new growth to occur at its own expense with minimal taxes and fee impacts upon current residents. (Program 4.4.2)
- Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance Part 49 Affordable Housing Density Bonuses and Concessions/Incentives (2007) and Part 50 West Grand Avenue Corridor Planned Development Overlay were adopted to provide opportunities for affordable housing and to encourage mixed-use projects. (Programs 5.1.2, 5.3.2, 5.3.3, 6.3.1)
- The City continues its participation in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's flood insurance program. (Program 5.5.2)
- The City continues to direct storm waters to underground reservoirs through the existing standards and specifications requirement that additional storm water from additional impervious areas be retained on the site. (Programs 8.1.3, 8.1.7, 8.1.8)
- The existing "gentleman's agreement" on water allocation ensures that the Arroyo Grande water basin users have agreed upon a water allocation and management plan which will promote sound planning and use of a valuable resource and will not exceed the safe-yield. (Programs 8.1.5, 8.1.6)
- Resources should be used in the preparation of a visitor and conference destination plan and promotional materials. The City selected a development company to move forward with the proposed Beachfront Lodge and Conference Center and worked toward preparation of an agreement for this project to move forward (with formal action occurring in 2009). (Program 8.5.3)
- Ramona Gardens Park serves as a center for community concerts and other community events and the improvements for parking and transit access in 2008 make this more accessible to the community. (Program 9.3.5)

With the adoption of the update Land Use Element, the City will begin tracking the goals, policies and programs established to reflect the priorities and direction of the City's visioning process.

Housing Element:

The State certified the City's Housing Element as being in compliance with State Housing Element law in November 2008. The Housing Element is generally required to be updated every 5 years. However, the next 5-year cycle must be prepared in 2009, with submittal of a draft plan for an initial 60 day-review period and submittal of the adopted plan addressing comments received from the state on the draft plan.

An Annual Report on the Status of the Housing Element must be prepared and submitted by April of each year. This report is presented as Attachment 1 to this report and highlights the City's progress on the following programs:

- Completion of the required vacant and under-utilized sites inventory. (Programs 1.1.1a, 6.1.1)
- Adoption of a Planned Development overlay along the West Grand Avenue Corridor (Part 50 of the Zoning Ordinance (2008)). (Program 1.1.1b)
- Initiation of the Habitat for Humanity four unit very-low affordable housing project with anticipated completion by December 2009. (Programs 1.1.2, 1.1.7, 2.1.2, 3.1.3, 6.1.2)
- Providing annual funding for rehabilitation of affordable housing units through the CDBG program. (Program 1.1.4)
- Implementing the affordable housing density bonus and incentive program resulting in creation of 12 affordable units to date (during the 3 year period). (Program 1.1.6)
- Amending of development standards and review procedures for second residential units in R-1 to meet state law requirement (adopted in 2004) resulting in construction of 3 units in 2008. (Programs 1.2.1, 7.4.1)
- Assure that California Building Code for handicapped accessibility and Title 24 energy requirements are met in review of building permit applications and provide handouts about conservation programs, retrofits, and low-income programs that are available. (Programs 4.1.1, 4.1.2, 8.2.1, 8.2.2)
- Initiated update of the Land Use Element to consider appropriate locations for workforce residential and non-residential development south of Farroll Road. (Programs 6.3.1, 7.2.1,)

A detailed progress report on the implementation status of the Housing Element is provided in Attachment 1 to this report. Since the certification of the Housing Element took a significant period of time, some of the tasks will be required to be addressed through the 2009 update and its implementation program. Staff has suggested a revised date for implementation in these charts; however, these will be reviewed in the preparation of the Housing Element based on staff resources and priorities established by the City Council.

Noise Element:

The Noise Element and its implementing noise requirements are generally addressed through the review of proposed development projects.

- The City reviews new public and private development proposals to determine conformance with Noise Element policies. (Measures 5.1, 5.2)
- During 2008, one project was required to complete a noise assessment; the Kautz Chevron project at 1284 Grand Avenue to ensure that noise requirements would be met.

Circulation Element:

The update to the Circulation Element occurred in 2005 and established a series of goals and programs to carry out the circulation needs of the community. During 2008, the city undertook the following actions directed at implementing the circulation element:

- Continues to pursue funding to construct improvements identified in the Circulation Master Plan and create a Capital Improvement Program to implement funded projects. (Programs 1.1.3, 1.4.1, 2.1.2, 3.1.1, 3.2.2, 3.3.2, 5.3.2)
- The City maintains established truck routes to direct trucks to appropriate road segments and to discourage truck traffic on local residential streets. (Program 1.6.1)
- Creation of bike lanes along the portions of Fourth Street that were being rehabilitated, including a public workshop to solicit community feedback. (Programs 3.1.1, 5.3.1)
- Completed further traffic analysis on three focus areas including: W. Grand Avenue study of circulation needs and possible consideration of diagonal parking in the downtown core; Margarita Avenue traffic calming needs, and evaluation of pedestrian needs on Oak Park in the Brighton Avenue area. The City Council provided direction for further actions needed for the W. Grand Avenue and Margarita Ave traffic calming. (Programs 1.2.4, 1.6.4, 2.1.3, 2.3.5, 3.3.2, 4.1.2)
- City continues to pursue funding to construct improvements identified in the Circulation Master Plan, including streetscape improvements in the W. Grand Avenue area from Highway 1 to 4th Street, Ramona Transit Center improvements, and future extension streetscape improvements for the remainder of Grand Avenue. The City maintains a Capital Improvement Program to construct improvements as identified and funded. (Programs 2.3.4, 3.2.2)
- The City continues to maintain a minimum traffic operating Level of Service of "C" on all City transportation facilities. (Program 1.2.3)
- The City initiated the Longbranch Demonstration project to identify methods of traffic calming and creation of improved street design that could be applied to other areas of the community. This study to evaluate alternative designs is anticipated to be completed in 2009. (Programs 1.2.4, 2.1.3, 2.3.4, 2.3.5, 4.1.2)

- The City continues to pursue Street Rehabilitation projects based upon available funding and periodically reviews the priority list with City Council to identify future rehabilitations. (Program 1.3.1)
- The City reviews proposed new development to ensure that adequate access, on-site circulation, parking and loading areas are provided, and that mitigation measures are incorporated where potential adverse impacts are identified. (Programs 2.2.1, 2.2.2, 2.2.3, 2.2.4, 2.3.2, 2.3.3)
- The City maintains a Traffic Committee and monitors safety considerations through accident reports and where appropriate considers preparation of warrant studies. (Programs 1.5.1, 1.5.2, 4.1.3)
- The City coordinates their actions with the transportation plans of adjacent cities, the County, SLOCOG, and Caltrans. (Programs 4.2.1, 4.2.2, 4.2.3)

Safety Element:

The Safety Element focuses on fire, flooding, geologic, and seismic hazards and is used in the review of individual projects to ensure that safety standards are incorporated into projects as appropriate. In addition, the Safety Element establishes programs for each of these areas that the city can strive to continue improvements aimed at public safety. The city has continued work on the following programs:

- The city has developed an Emergency Operational Center and participates in annual drills to ensure that its procedures/personnel are working effectively. In addition, the city participated in the tsunami drill called by County Emergency Office Service in cooperation with Diablo Nuclear Power Plant. The City has designated and trained a Public Information Officer. (Programs 1.1.2, 1.3.1, 1.6.1, 2.3.1, 2.3.2, 5.1.2)
- The City has received the updated flood hazards information from FEMA and this is used in the review of projects. The city has reviewed low-lying areas flood prone areas and has commenced storm water improvement on Grand Avenue, Mentone Basin, and 5th Street drainage improvements. (Programs 2.1.1, 2.1.3)
- The City has adopted Fire Sprinkler Protection Ordinance and a Multi-Family dwelling inspection program has been implemented. (Program 3.1)
- A Boundary Drop with the City of Arroyo Grande and Oceano Community Services District (CSD) to respond with closest unit to emergencies. Continue to pursue fire service consolidation efforts with City of Arroyo Grande and Oceano CSD. (Program 3.2)
- Standardization of training between Grover Beach, Arroyo Grande, and Oceano Fire Departments. (Program 3.3)
- City Weed Abatement Program reduces the hazard that flammable vegetation presents in the community. (Policy 3.4)

- The Building division of Community Development enforces applicable building codes pertaining to the design of structures and grading relative to flooding, fire, and seismic safety. (Programs 1.5.1, 1.5.2, 4.3.2, 4.3.3, 4.4.1, 4.4.2, 4.5.4, 5.6.1)

Open Space – Conservation Element:

The Open Space – Conservation Element was adopted jointly with the City of Arroyo Grande in 1973 and is linked to the original adoption of the Open Space Conservation Element completed by the County. Specific recommendations are provided for Agricultural Lands, Recreation and Park Land, Wildlife Habitat, Natural Resources Land, Watershed and Water Recharge Lands. The plan provides map associated with these facilities. Staff uses the policies and recommendations when reviewing proposed development, including the environmental review of both public and private development. In addition, the element identifies a range of methods to achieve open space and conservation goals identified in the plan.

The City of Arroyo Grande adopted an update Open Space – Conservation Element in 2001 to more directly link with the update of the Land Use Element of the General Plan. The City should consider preparing an update of the Open Space – Conservation Element once the Land Use Element is updated in 2009 to ensure these are appropriately coordinated.

Scenic Routes Element:

The Scenic Routes element provides goals, objectives, and policies that address preservation of scenic views from the identified scenic corridors (Highway 1, Grand Avenue, 4th Street north of Grand Avenue, Oak Park Boulevard, Atlantic City from 4th Street to Oak Park, N. 12th Street from Atlantic City to El Camino Road, El Camino Road, and Highway 101. These are considered in the review of proposed public and private development and provide recommendations concerning transmission towers and lines, undergrounding of utilities when feasible, landscaping to increase scenic quality, creation of view corridors. This element was adopted in 1981 and should be considered for an update to ensure that it is still well coordinated with other circulation and scenic route programs within the county that have more recently updated.

The City's effort to incorporate undergrounding requirements in projects, particularly along the scenic routes and the proposed streetscape improvements along Grand Avenue are aligned with the direction provided in the Scenic Route Element of the General Plan.

Parks and Recreation:

The Parks and Recreation Element is an optional component of the City's General Plan and was updated in 2005. Specific programs being addressed include:

- Initiation of the Cleaver Park Master Plan and associated environmental determination (Programs 2.1.1, 2.1.2, 2.3.2)
- Ongoing communications with State, County and neighboring cities to establish an urban trails system. Private donors secured. (Programs 2.2.1, 2.2.2, 4.3.1, 4.3.2, 4.3.3.)

- Development of the Parks and Facilities Matrix. (Program 2.3.3, 5.1.1)
- Continue to provide a wide range of program, classes, events and services that respond to the changing needs of the community. (Program 3.1.1, 3.1.2)
- Use of variety of funding sources to expand, acquire, develop and maintain the community's park, recreation and natural areas and list park projects in the City's Five-Year Capital Improvement Project list. (Program 5.1.1)
- Continue Quimby park dedications or payment of in-lieu fees as well as development impact fees for all new residential development to provide funds for parkland acquisitions and/or development. (Program 5.2.1)
- Master Fee Schedule annually reviewed. (Program 5.3.2)
- Staff is exploring development of the Railroad Corridor and El Camino Oaks Trails. (Program 4.3.1, 4.3.2, 4.3.3)
- In the development review process of projects with facilities proposed to meet park required, the Parks and Recreation Director provides recommendations. (Program 6.2.1)
- Implementation of drought tolerant landscaping and stainless steel fixtures at City parks and restroom facilities. (Program 6.3.1)
