SUBJECT: COVID-19 Response Update

RECOMMENDATION

Receive an update on the countywide and City response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

BACKGROUND

The City continues its work in addressing the COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic following the direction of the County Public Health Department in coordination with other local agencies. The following is an update on the status of the COVID-19 pandemic in the county as well as the City's continued response since the last regular Council meeting on April 12.

Countywide Status

As of April 21, San Luis Obispo County has 21,010 confirmed COVID-19 cases with 7 current hospitalizations (3 in the ICU) and 203 individuals at home and 20,540 individuals recovered (approximately 98%). This is only a 1.7% increase in the number of cases in the past two weeks along with a 9% decline in the number of active cases which continue to be positive trends that point to improving conditions. For reference, there were approximately 3,500 active cases at the peak of the holiday surge in mid-January. Approximately 37% (7,858) of the confirmed cases in this county are in North County with 4,108 in Paso Robles and 3,750 in Atascadero, Templeton, and elsewhere. Approximately 33% (6,987) of cases are in the central part of the county with the vast majority (4,197) in San Luis Obispo.

In South County, there has been a total of 4,946 confirmed cases (approximately 24% of countywide cases) with 1,471 in Arroyo Grande, 1,565 in Nipomo, 874 in Grover Beach, 696 in Oceano, and 338 in Pismo Beach. Case numbers in Grover Beach per 1,000 residents (65) continue to be lower than Arroyo Grande (82) and Oceano (97) though higher than Pismo Beach (41). Over the past two weeks, there has only been a 1.3% increase in cases in Grover Beach which is similar to the countywide average and reflects the overall downward trends.

As the Council is aware, the State uses an approach called the *Blueprint for a Safer Economy* to determine what businesses can and cannot open safely during the COVID-19 pandemic. Every county is assigned to a tier based on its test positivity and adjusted case rate and counties are moved to less or more restrictive tiers based on changing metrics including a "health equity" metric for census tracts with lower health conditions that must be met to move to a less restrictive tier. The table on the following page shows the four tiers of the *Blueprint* approach and the metrics used to determine placement:

San Luis Obispo County continues to be in the “red” or “Substantial” tier based on the *Blueprint*. The county currently has an adjusted case rate of 6.0 new cases per day per 100,000 population on a rolling seven-day average and a positivity rate of 2.4% and health equity metric of 4.2%. The county is just above the threshold to move down to the “orange” tier given the adjusted case rate as this rate needs to be 5.9 or lower for two consecutive weeks. Attachment 1 shows an updated comparison of restrictions under each of the tiers for the Council’s reference. The State announced plans to release remaining restrictions for businesses and other activities beginning on June 15. This plan is entitled *Beyond the Blueprint* and would effectively end the four-color tiers of restrictions and allow normal business operations and activities if vaccine supply was sufficient for those 16 years or older and hospitalizations remained low. The State would continue with its mask mandate for the time being as a precautionary measure.

The City continues to monitor these trends carefully in conjunction with the County and other local agencies and carry out compliance work to protect public health and safety. The City remains committed to helping achieve community compliance with State and local orders focused on education and awareness with enforcement action as a last resort if other steps are not successful. Businesses in the city overall have continued to do an excellent job of complying with the public health requirements including adherence to the State’s order mandating face coverings usage indoors. The level for compliance activity has continued to decrease given the current level of allowed activity and overall compliance level of residents and businesses. Such compliance

continues to be important in helping our community continue to meet the public health thresholds for greater reopening of businesses and activities.

The County continues to work diligently on vaccine distribution which is key to ending this pandemic. The County has received and administered 126,848 vaccine doses as of April 16 at vaccination sites in San Luis Obispo, Paso Robles, and Arroyo Grande. Everyone 16 years or older can sign up for a vaccine appointment on the County's website at [COVID-19 Vaccines in SLO County - San Luis Obispo County \(recoverslo.org\)](#). The City is sending out communications to encourage other community members to get vaccinated and City employees continue to serve with other public employees to staff these vaccination clinics.

Business Assistance Update

The City continues to work with the South County Chambers of Commerce on the "#BuyLocal" gift card program launched on February 10 to support businesses in the continued economic recovery from COVID-19. The City committed to providing up to \$50,000 to purchase gift cards to participating Grover Beach businesses given to customers who spend at least \$100 at a retailer, restaurant, or other business within the city and submit receipts to the Chamber. There are 24 businesses currently participating in this program with the list of businesses available on the Chamber's website where people can submit receipts ([Grover Beach #BuyLocal Program \(jotform.com\)](#)). As of April 15, there have been 640 individual receipts submitted representing approximately \$53,000 in customer spending. Counting the \$18,500 spent to date purchasing gift cards at participating businesses, there has been approximately \$71,500 in additional spending at local businesses since the program began. The #BuyLocal program continues to provide significant economic benefit by incentivizing customer spending at local businesses by residents and visitors. There is no set end date for the program as the City and Chamber plan to continue this program through at least the remainder of the spring.

City Response Update

Lastly, the City continues to provide services to our community in accordance with statewide orders and public health guidelines though City facilities including City Hall and Community Centers remain closed to public access. City employees continue to work predominantly remotely in accordance with public health guidance on offices while continuing to provide services for the public. The public can contact the City at (805) 473-4550 or cityhall@groverbeach.org or through specific City departments to ask questions or get more information about City services or projects. City playgrounds, sports courts, and the skate park remain open though users need to follow public health requirements. The City has not announced a timeframe yet for resuming public access to City facilities including the public counter at City Hall and walk-in visits to the Community Center along with in-person Council and Commission meetings as public health guidance and continued downward trends in cases will inform the timeframe for safe public access.

The City continues to not hold in-person events at this time but is planning for resumption of events later this year starting with the concert series at Ramona Park. The exact timing is still undetermined given the timing of the vaccine distribution and related ability to safely hold large-scale community gatherings again.
